
# Traffic Calming Measures at Easter Compton, Pilning and Severn Beach – Parishioners' Feedback

They wrote to me about that about a year ago.


Because I am registered to receive all consultations concerning Severn Beach, Pilning and Easter Compton from S/G council. As such I have read them through several times and responded to the council.

## Why did you give it this rating?

### Ratings 1-3 (59)

My answer is the same as for the proposed systems for Pilning and Severn Beach

As the new speed limit is 20mph, by South Glos's own data, the average speed is over the legal limit. If the average speed recorded is illegally high, how can that be a 'success'?

I am generally on my cycle when I go through Easter Compton, but when I have driven, I find that, bar the one continuous speed hump, the spacing of the humps is such that even in my small car, the wheels sit either side and therefore the humps are completely ineffectual. Further, gas guzzling 4x4 type vehicles designed with off road capabilities can drive over the humps with impunity.

There are two annoyances to myself, my neighbours and presumably fellow residents in Redwick/Pilning/EC and SB. The first is noise and the second is large lorries thundering along our B roads.

A significant proportion of cars and motorbikes/mopeds have illegal silencers and those travelling over say 30mph exacerbates the issue. Quite a few vehicles come through either/or at such speed and volume they are taking the mickey! The standard issue, poor man's option of speed humps does nothing to control this problem. Vehicles just slow then accelerate, causing extra noise - And pollution. Plus of course extra congestion. Outside my house we usually have a lot of cars parked on the road/pavement, this just makes the noise situation worse. As I work from home I get used to repeat offenders with race style exhausts and doing maybe 70mph. Yes, really! Come and do some speed monitoring down here....

The second problem us NiMBYs moan about is trucks over the 7.5T weight limit - That is the posted legal limit - But with 'Except for Access'. We get everything regularly from 7.5T up to full sized 'artic's - My house, like many here, is very close to the road and these large trucks literally shake the house, totally inappropriate for the village/road! I have lived here ('Redwick', the West side of the A403) since 1974 and I have NEVER seen any police roadside law enforcement of speed/noise/weight, EVER! I appreciate that we have the Severn rail tunnel/Severn bridge etc that needs heavy plant, but there are many other heavy traffic that appear dubious. Whatever, with no police presence, people can do what they want.

The biggest serial offender for over 7.5T is Avon Commercial Recovery, based in the middle of a housing estate in Severn Beach. They have a 24/7 operation and the majority of their fleet is over 7.5T They regularly shake our houses as they rumble through and often in the middle of the night. They are not always within the 30mph speed limit either, which doesn't help. I appreciate

their business predates even the housing estate and that their operation is probably legal (when they don't break the speed limit) but although they are within the letter of the law they are certainly not within it's spirit. Perhaps they should be 'encouraged' to find new premises on the Western Approaches say, which would be far more appropriate for their business.

As regards what funds SHOULD be spent on, the budget for some speed humps is unlikely to cover what is needed to be effective, but here goes:

Policing of speeding - And noise! Obvious really, but now that this and the previous government have eviscerated the policing budget as part of 'austerity', that's not going to happen anytime soon - It's not happened so far since 1974! Failing that, speed cameras of course. Again, third world UK can't afford them and existing ones have mostly been turned off. Please don't install humps, chicanes or any other worse than useless stuff that will exacerbate the noise problem! Funds would be better spent on say, improving the cycle track infrastructure. It would be better to admit there isn't the budget to do anything effective rather than waste money on measures that make matters worse.

I note that the speed limit has been lowered to 20mph in EC. I would suggest that 30mph is perfectly acceptable for safety and residents alike - As long as it's observed and vehicles are properly silenced. As far as I'm aware there has never been an accident along my stretch of Redwick Road as long as I have lived here.

Ineffective. You can drive over the bumps at 40mph and hardly feel a thing. Average speed has only decreased because average driver obeys the speed limit.

From the article I was surprised to see that the pre calming average speed was 31mph, the then speed limit-I'd imagined calming was needed because of excessive speeding through the village. If the reason was to allow easier crossing of the road rather than excessive speed, then a pedestrian crossing would have been a better solution. On a practical level the individual speed humps are offset and not even wrt the road centreline

#### its ok was it needed NO

The speed hump at the top of the village near Bow St Ln is too severe in height and being the same colour as the tarmac is dangerous to negotiate in the dark or in weather conditions with reduced visibility. The speed cushions are ineffective for motor cyclist and larger vehicles with a wider spacing between wheels.

## So unnecessary.

The average speed before was only 31mph which is reasonable for a major link road .The measures put in are very excessive expensive and out of date for the small improvement as we drive in a low gear with higher acceleration using more fuel and creating more pollution

I always try to stick to the new speed and take the traffic calming bumps slowly also and am constantly tail gated and have people overtake me. It is very stressful. I want to stress however I think it should be 20 mph zone

#### Ratings 4-5 (13)

It has slowed traffic

Traffic is kept to an acceptable speed

It has reduced the speed through the village.

Traffic much calmer and the position of the cushions make drivers think about the road/ their surroundings.

I think the large bump at the beginning should be at the middle and end as well.

The pads encourage drivers to slow down as they negotiate them, plus act as a reminder of the speed limit. It doesn't stop determined speeders but I think it will lower the overall average.


I think it has had some effect.

Speeding has always been a problem and this was long overdue.

Parked cars near bumps make it very hard to use bumps properly between wheels

With minimal disruption the speed of vehicles has reduced

Those that want to speed still do and claiming reduction of speed to 25mph is still breaking the law



PILNING - If your answer was "No", what would you like the allocated funds to be spent on?

Judiciously sited system of speed cameras, properly administered.

If speeding is the issue then provision of a safety camera, if it is crossing the road then additional pedestrian crossing provision would be more efficient than calming. If the budget is able to be spent on other infrastructure projects then improved public transport would have a bigger impact

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### better signs illuminated

I'd prefer any available funds to be spent on alternative traffic calming measures such as footway build-outs, chicanes, priority lanes or living space planters which would drastically reduce noise and vibration of motorised vehicles negotiating them when compared to humps, tables and cushions.


This might send more traffic into Northwick, already busy with large tankers / lorries and speeding cars and vans.

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
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Provision of cycle lanes or installation of speed camera retaining present speed limits

Also maintenance of road ,footpaths and keeping junctions clear of overgrown trees and vegetation

The biggest local traffic issue is the great increase in the volume and speed of traffic the A403, this has changed markedly in the last couple of months, not only with more trucks, but more importantly cars speeding to overtake on the short stretches of dual carriageway between Pilning and Aust. There have already been a number of near misses trying to cross the A403 to access the public footpaths to the Severn.

I would have appreciated the opportunity to feedback comments directly to SGC had myself as a resident of the area been aware consultation had taken place. The first I was aware of this scheme was via the community Facebook page.

I am concerned that the proposed traffic calming scheme at Pilning might make the traffic use alternative routes into Easter Compton (e.g. The Wave) from the M48 - these would be vehicles travelling through Northwick and then via Bank Road, potentially speeding through the village's narrow road and past the school. This is particularly concerning, as Pilning, Severn Beach and Easter Compton where the scheme is going to be implemented, all have pavements. If due to traffic calming in these villages more traffic was to come through Northwick, the fact that we have no pavement and a lot of people (often with young children) walk and cycle through the village, should be seriously considered.

No scheme will stop the problem of increased vehicles and speeding. Marginal improvements are the very best you can hope for

Considering residents in Redwick Road restrict traffic to single lane most of the time I cannot believe speed is an enormous problem.

Please don't do any more traffic calming measures, if people are going to speed they will.

I question why especially Severn Beach is singled out for such excessive measures when it is not a rat run or through road is very quiet .In my travels throughout South Glos I do not see any evidence of other village communities being treated like this the vast majority have 30mph limits except of outside schools where speed humps have not been added

I think all 3 areas have been massively impacted with hugely increased traffic volumes but if new zones to be introduced they need to be policed and people speeding need to pay penalties. People are driving dangerously through Pilning and when I'm walking my dog I sometimes fear for our safety. Ridiculous. And what is going on with the huge lorries!
